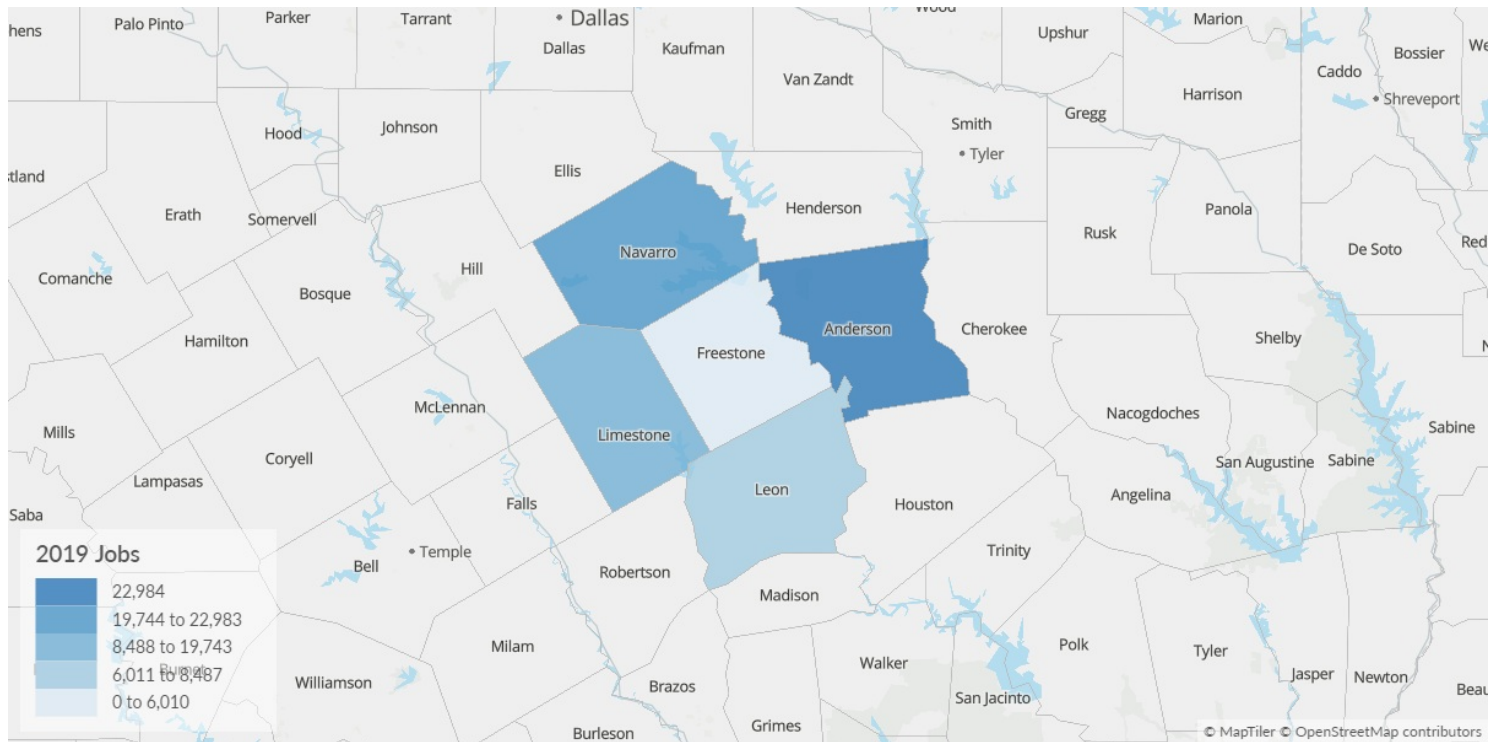

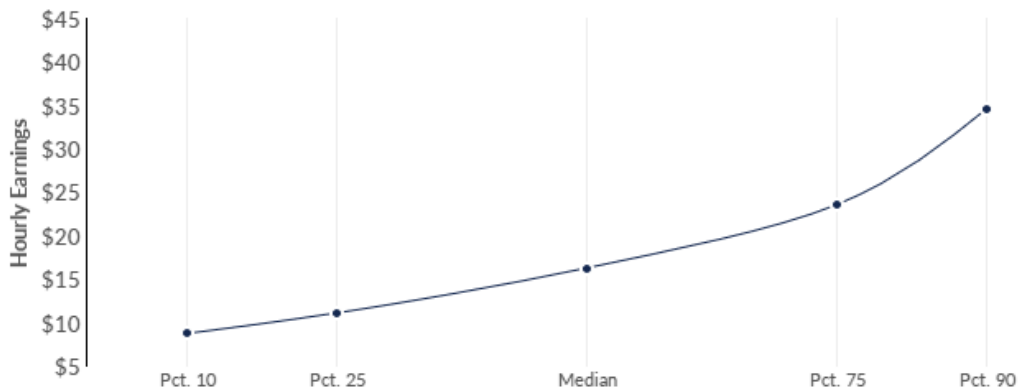

- 97 Occupations increased by 838 from 2014-2019 (1.4%), less than the national growth rate of 7.9%. The occupations are projected to increase by 4,246 from 2019-2024 (6.8%), outpacing the national projected growth rate of 5.6%.
- Regional job concentration per capita for jobs in these 97 occupations is 1.00 times the national job concentration. In other words, there are 0% more jobs in these 97 occupations in this region than we would expect to find in the average region.
- Cost of labor in the region is below median. The median earnings for 97 Occupations in the region is \$16.28/hr, which is \$2.86/hr below the national median of \$19.14/hr.

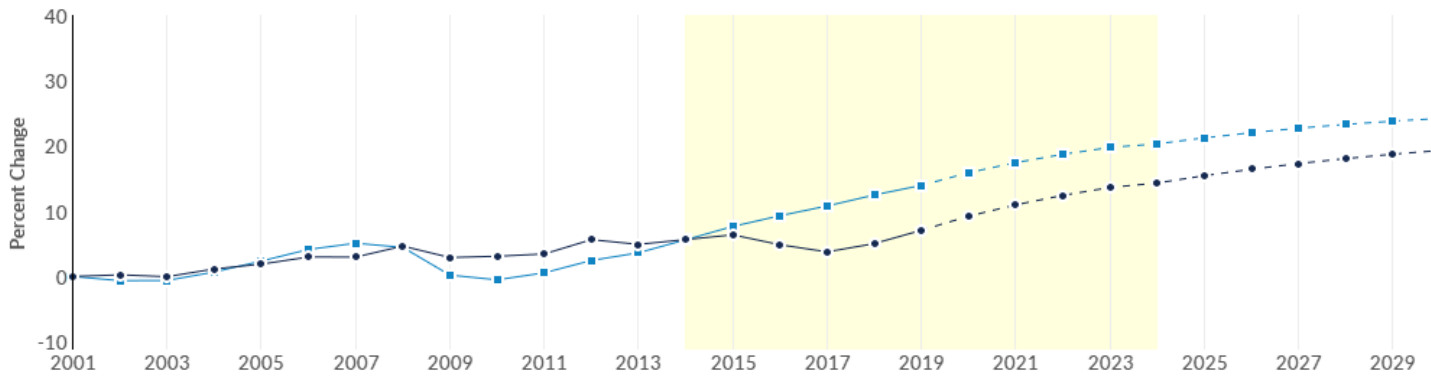

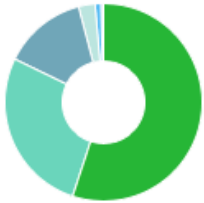

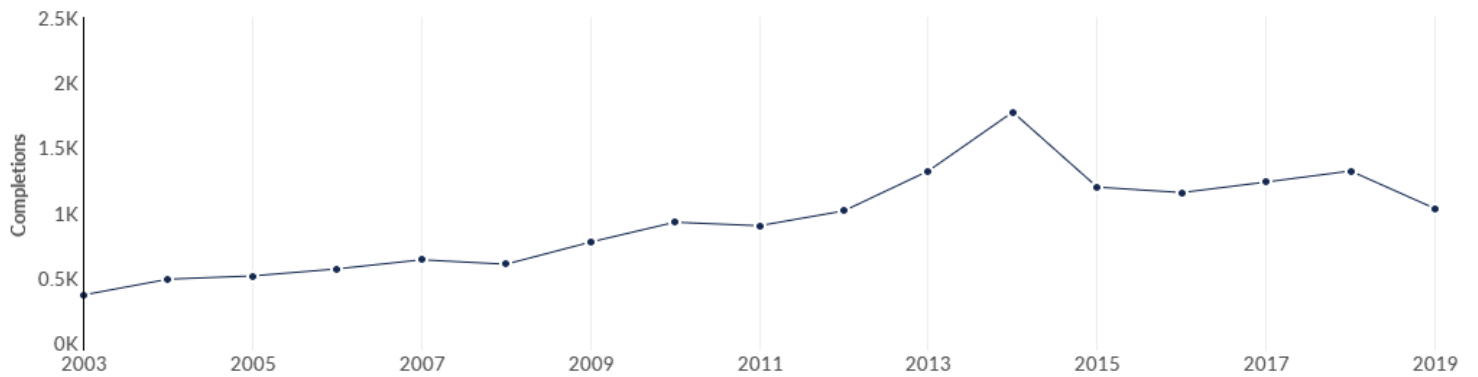

Appendix B - Data Sources and Calculations

Institution Data

The institution data in this report is taken directly from the national IPEDS database published by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics.

Location Quotient

Location quotient (LQ) is a way of quantifying how concentrated a particular industry, cluster, occupation, or demographic group is in a region as compared to the nation. It can reveal what makes a particular region unique in comparison to the national average.

Occupation Data

Emsi occupation employment data are based on final Emsi industry data and final Emsi staffing patterns. Wage estimates are based on Occupational Employment Statistics (QCEW and Non-QCEW Employees classes of worker) and the American Community Survey (Self-Employed and Extended Proprietors). Occupational wage estimates also affected by county-level Emsi earnings by industry.
